Exeter Mosque is proud to announce that the progression of the Exeter peace garden, proposed in January 2021, is coming along smoothly. The garden is achieving its aim of providing excellent horticulture through the introduction of flower beds, olive trees and the installation of a pergola with a beautiful wooden pathway.

The concept behind the garden is to benefit Muslims and the wider community, encourage conversations between people and help increase community cohesion whilst improving the environment and increasing awareness of maintaining biodiversity through the introduction of different plants.

Over the coming months the mosque is to install an outside pizza oven and circular seating area for people to sit and enjoy the garden and hopes to open the garden to the community in March 2023 In shaa Allah (God willing).



Exeter Civic University Agreement Community Panel

A new Community Panel was convened by Exeter University in June to support the delivery of the new Civic University Agreement.

The stated aims of the Agreement are to:

- 1. Support the sustainable and inclusive growth of the city
- 2. Deliver a net zero Exeter
- 3. Build a city of aspiration and opportunity

- 4. Support an ambitious culture and tourism offer
- 5. Enhance the health and wellbeing of our citizens

The purpose of the Panel is to help identify local issues, challenges and opportunities; to find ways to increase student-community cohesion and to help the university listen to and engage with the local community. The Panel consists of nine residents drawn from across Exeter, who serve for a duration of three years. BEWARE SCAMMERS!

Scammers in Exeter are attempting to exploit the often tenuous link between tenants, landlords and Exeter City Council by pretending to be tradesmen or officials. They target properties that appear to be tenanted, claiming they have been sent by the landlord, or by the Council, and attempt to gain entry in order to steal or to make bogus repairs. As always, the advice is to check credentials before letting anyone into your home.

Exeter Community Safety Partnership (CSP)

CSP has received a significant funding boost of £680,250 from the Home Office's Safer Streets Fund to help enhance night time safety measures across the city centre. The funding will allow several initiatives launched across the city in the next two years aimed at helping to prevent antisocial behaviour and tackle violence against women and members of the LGBT+ community, in and around Exeter city centre, particularly at night.

The project focusses on five key areas - creating a night-time safe space, enhanced CCTV and lighting, bystander intervention training, schools education programme and a good neighbour project for students.

'No' to more Purpose Built Student Accommodation in St James!

Showing support for the Neighbourhood Plan pays off...

Many living in Union Road and Culverland Close were aghast to discover a planning application had been submitted for a 10 bed purpose built student accommodation (PBSA) in the back garden of 47 Union Road, itself a 13 bed student House in Multiple Occupation. Their dismay was shared by residents across St James who expect our Neighbourhood Plan to be respected, guarding the neighbourhood against such development that would worsen the existing community imbalance. Over sixty residents submitted objections

during the consultation period and our city councillors were very supportive. After a long delay a decision has been made to refuse the application. The applicant may well appeal so the concern has not ended, but there can be no doubt that the large number of objections played a significant part in the decision.

... BUT, time to do so again!

Hot on the heels a revised application 21/1014/FUL for 26 bed PBSA on the old Maximum Motors site. Howell Road is out for consultation until 11 December. Worryingly the documentation includes a planning officer's confirmation that in principle a PBSA is acceptable in this location, showing complete disregard for the Neighbourhood Plan. The NP is clear that in St James such PBSA can only be accommodated in locations not 'predominantly characterised by intact streets of traditional terraced, semidetached and detached forms of 2-3 storey residential development' and 'where the servicing and parking requirements could be achieved with no unacceptable impact on the amenity of the adjacent area for residents

If you support the NP's vision for a balanced community please object to this application by 11 December, even if you objected to the original version. You may submit comments online or by emailing roger.clotworthy@exeter.gov.uk. It has never been more important to demand the City Council gives the recognition required to the statutory NP, prepared with such hard work, commitment, and determination by local residents and supported by the University and Student Guild.

Hazel Greenlaw (Feb 1950 -July 2022)

Hazel lived to dance. A Royal Academy of Dance Teacher, she had her own ballet school in Richmond, London before moving to Devon where she taught the Ballet for Adults classes at Exeter Phoenix Arts Centre.

Following an accident in 2016 Hazel became increasingly immobile and was housebound by the end of 2019. She missed her classes

and her students enormously but had one consolation, her reading and her library: well over 1,000 fiction and non-fiction books covering every subject imaginable which she carried on buying until her sudden death in July.

Hazel gifted her books to her beneficiaries with many of them bequeathed to the Queen's Crescent Garden project which helped raise much-needed funds at our recent book sale. A further sale is planned next spring when another 800 or so of her

books will be available to browse and to buy. Hazel would be delighted to know that her library was not only being put to a good use but was also now able to be enjoyed far and wide.

Some worry over slurry

The pavements in Powderham Crescent have been coated with 'slurry', several other streets in St James have had the same treatment recently. Residents saw the work cancelled several times over the past year for a variety of reasons including staff shortage and the lorry not being able to get past parked cars. On one attempt the advance information wasn't clear. Finally in October it was done over a couple days with residents having got the message to move their cars away. Some people criticise the treatment as it doesn't level out the dips and bumps. They say the uniform black surface means you can't see the unevenness making walking more hazardous.



PCRA Bonfire Night

Sunday 6 November, in a very fortunate lull between heavy showers, saw PCRA's annual bonfire celebrations go with a bang! The central garden was transformed into an illuminated wonderland and the crescent resounded to the sound of amplified music. Well over a hundred residents, friends and student neighbours gathered to enjoy the occasion spiced up with contributions of food to share and lashings of mulled wine. Once the fire had died down the fireworks began and what a show it was – a truly heart-warming community event!





Changing Buses in St James

The F2 service used to run every half hour in daytime from Sidwell Street – Pennsylvania Road – Union Road and return. Now replaced by a new F service which runs every two hours serving the loop around West Garth Road and Wrefords Lane instead of the H which terminates at St Davids Station. The U bus still serves Pennsylvania Road to loop around Beech Avenue, Sylvan Road and Union Road but there are just three journeys in the mornings.

The bus stop by the mosque in York Road is served by new services 4 to Cranbrook & 4A to the airport, alternately every 20 minutes. Service 56 to the airport is removed. This stop is also served by buses from north and west Devon which come in from Cowley Bridge. Going out of Exeter they don't use York Road but go directly to New North Road past John Lewis.
