

Planning decisions update

Two planning applications for purpose built student accommodation (PBSA) have recently been determined. Permission has been granted for the conversion of Beaufort House in New North Road to flats for 107 students, and although the application for 26 bed PBSA on the site of Maximum Motors in Howell Road was refused by Planning Committee, it was clear this would not be the end of the story.

Thanks to the much-needed, independent investigative journalism now provided by Exeter Observer Ltd (EO), a not-for-profit community benefit society like the Trust, Freedom of Information (FOI) requests have finally been revealing the extent of the long-suspected misrepresentation of student numbers habitually given by the University. The provision to the Council over the years of serious under-estimates,

has clearly resulted in flawed evidence bases for formulation of related planning policy. The Council has long-recognised and regretted the unreliability of its own best estimate numbers of students living in HMOs using council tax exemption data, so it is unfortunate that the HMO consultation is being undertaken just at the time when accurate figures of the number of students living in the city's residential housing stock should soon be available. Would it be wise to pause the review?

EO is awaiting a final piece of information. so far withheld by the University, which will allow accurate determination of this number for the last full academic year. EO explains: after Information Commissioner's Office investigation, our public interest quest to publish the truth about the university's impact on the city's housing supply has led us to a First-tier Information Rights Tribunal where a judge will decide the case sometime in the next few weeks.
