The Association is discussing ways they can actively support planning that is environmentally sustainable, meets local need and maintains community balance.

Inspector Dave Turner, who was introduced in the Summer 2024 edition, updates us on local policing matters:

It has been a busy summer in both Exeter and the St James area. The national riots caused considerable tension in the city centre and surrounding suburbs. It was genuinely heart warming to see all communities in the St James area working together to help prevent any disorder from occurring and I am grateful for this.

In September we ran a week long operation during the university's welcome week. Working with the university and council we were able to place more officers into the city centre and surrounding areas. The week went well with few incidents to deal with.

Our priorities for St James over the winter period and into the spring will be to focus on anti-social behaviour, tackling violence against women and girls, and disrupting the use and supply of illegal drugs. Your PCSO Paul Fudge and PC Richard Jephcott will be out and about and I encourage you all to say hello to them if you see them.

#### **Road Repairs**

Councillor Percy Prowse is pleased to report that Devon County Council has secured enough contractors to fulfil spending the last government's money for patching and resurfacing damaged roads in the County, City and St.James. This was long overdue!

#### **Appeal Dismissed!**

Appeal against the refusal to grant planning permission for a 6 bed student accommodation block in the rear garden of 70 Pennsylvania Road DISMISSED!



70 Pennsylvania Road, licensed as a 17 bedroom student HMO

As reported in the Winter 2023 issue, this application came hot on the heels of the refusal of a similar application for a 10 bed student block in the rear garden of 47 Union Road and despite the unsuccessful attempt by the same owner, Mr Startup, to have this refusal overturned at appeal.

Exeter City Council eventually refused the Pennsylvania Road application and once again Mr Startup submitted an appeal to HM Planning Inspectorate with the same result.

The Appeal Notice shows the Inspector weighed up all relevant factors when reaching his decision, and was persuaded amongst other matters by the harm it would do to the character and appearance of the Londbrook Conservation Area and also to

# benefit from the provision of further student accommodation. Will this deter Mr Startup from appealing yet another refusal, again for 47 Union Road, this

another refusal, again for 47 Union Road, this time for a 6 bed student accommodation block in the rear garden? Time will tell, but in the light of the Inspector's conclusion it would seem a forlorn exercise!

Bury Meadow Park Volunteers, BMPV, have been busy planting bulbs and keeping the Park looking cared for this year. The local councillors support them with small grants to fund the planting projects, including a lovely herb garden by the playground, and the local Beavers have made a bug hotel for the Park The University provides student volunteers from the Community Engagement team too.

### 6 Second phase of regeneration


